

WINTER HOLIDAYS

Vocabulary

holiday – a time of rest from work or school

the holiday season – the time from late November through January when several holidays (such as Christmas and New Year's Eve) happen

vacation – a holiday or time spent not working

day off – a day's holiday from work or school on what would normally be a working day

tradition – a belief, custom, or way of doing something that has existed for a long time, or these beliefs, customs etc in general

Christmas – the period of time around December 25th, the day when Christians celebrate the birth of Christ

Noel – means Christmas, the word is used especially in songs and on cards candy cane – a stick of hard red and white sugar with a curved end candle – a stick of wax with a string through the middle, which you burn to give light poinsettia – a tropical plant with groups of large red or white leaves that look like flowers (it is also known as Christmas Flower)

bauble/(Christmas) ornament – a brightly colored decoration that looks like a ball and is used to decorate a Christmas tree

Christmas stocking – a long sock or similar receptacle hung up by children on Christmas Eve to be filled with presents

Christmas cookie – a cookie that people eat in the US at Christmas

Christmas tree – a fir tree that people put in their houses and decorate for Christmas

fir – a tree with leaves shaped like needles that do not fall off in winter

pine – a tall tree with long hard sharp leaves that do not fall off in winter

reindeer – a large deer with long wide antlers (horns), that lives in cold northern areas, usually associated with Christmas

Boxing Day – the day after Christmas Day, which is a public holiday in the UK and some other countries

holly – a small tree with sharp dark green leaves and red berries or the leaves and berries of this tree, used as a decoration at Christmas

costume – a set of clothes worn by people to make them look like something such as an animal, famous person, etc.

Hanukkah – an eight-day Jewish holiday in November or December

Menorah (Hanukkah) – a Jewish candlestick that holds seven or nine candles New Year's Day – a national holiday celebrated on January 1, the first day of the New Year

bell – a hollow metal object like a cup with a piece of metal hanging inside it that makes a ringing

ball drop – refers to the New Year's Eve celebration in New York's Times Square that features a large ball sliding down a pole until it reaches the ground at midnight

New Year's resolution – a firm decision made on New Year's Eve or New Year's Day to do or refrain from doing something over the course of the coming year

eve – the night or day before a holiday or an important day

Valentine's Day – celebrated on February 14, a day when you give a valentine card to someone you have (or would like to have) a romantic relationship with buying presents

Cupid – the god of desire, love, attraction, and affection, commonly used to represent love

ring – a piece of jewelry that you wear on your finger

proposal – an offer of marriage

engagement – an agreement between two people to marry or the period of time they are engaged

shopping – the activity of going to shops and buying things

window-shopping – the activity of looking at goods in shop windows without intending to buy them

gift/present – something that you give someone, for example, to thank them or because you like them, especially on a special occasion

balloon – an object made of brightly coloured thin rubber that is filled with air and used as a toy or decoration for parties

greeting card – a decorative card sent with good wishes

gift tag – a tag attached to a gift that says who it is from

party – an event when a lot of people meet together to enjoy themselves by eating, drinking, dancing, etc.

crowd – a large group of people

annual – yearly

family reunion – an occasion when members of an extended family gather together **advent** – the period of four weeks before Christmas in the Christian religion **announcement** – an important or official statement

decoration – something pretty that you put in a place or on top of something to make it look attractive

dressing – a mixture of liquids, usually oil and vinegar, that you put on salad or raw vegetables

eggnog – a drink made from eggs, sugar, milk, and alcohol, drunk at Christmas
elf – an imaginary creature like a small person with pointed ears and magical powers
goodwill – kind feelings towards or between people and a willingness to be helpful
frosty – extremely cold

icicle – a long thin pointed piece of ice hanging from a roof or other surface

jolly – happy and enjoying yourself

merry - happy, cheerful, jolly

miracle – something very lucky or very good that happens which you did not expect to happen or did not think was possible



mistletoe – a plant with small white berries, which grows on trees

North Pole – the most northern point on the surface of the Earth

parade – a public celebration when musical bands, brightly decorated vehicles etc move down the street

pie – fruit baked inside a pastry covering

sacred – relating to a god or religion

sledge – a small vehicle used for sliding over snow, often used by children or in some sports

togetherness – the pleasant feeling you have when you are part of a group of people who have a close relationship with each other

Verbs

to help – to make it possible or easier for someone to do something by doing part of their work or by giving them something they need

to worry – to be anxious or unhappy about someone or something so that you think about them a lot

to celebrate – to take part in special enjoyable activities in order to show that a particular event or holiday is important

to cook – to prepare food for eating by using heat

to bake – to cook something in an oven using dry heat

to buy – to get something by paying money for it

to prepare – to make plans or arrangements for something that will happen in the future

to order – to ask for food or a drink in a restaurant, bar

to handle – to manage, to solve a situation or a problem

to prance – to walk or dance with high steps or large movements, especially in a confident way

Phrases

a bundle of nerves – someone who is very nervous

to be (just) around the corner – to be not far away or to happen very soon **You are spot on.** – You are correct.

take it easy – used to tell someone to relax and to not think much of the situationto make a shopping list – to make a list of things you want to buy so you will notforget them

to exchange gifts/presents – when someone gives you a present and, in return, you give them one as well

to have a look at something – to look at something in a quick manner



to calm down – to become quiet and relaxed after you have been angry, excited, nervous, or upset, or to make someone become quiet and relaxed

to do a favour (BrE)/favor (AmE) – something that you do for someone in order to help them or be kind to them

to wander around – to walk somewhere without a destination or purpose

to take time off – to take a vacation from work for some period of time

What's up? - an informal way of asking someone what is new in their life

to live the life – when someone is really enjoying themselves and they are having a really good time without worrying about anything, including money

SO (short for significant other) – your husband/wife or boyfriend/girlfriend

to turn one's life around – to completely change or improve one's life

to pop the champagne – to open a bottle of champagne with a peculiar "pop" sound

to quit cold turkey – to quit a bad habit all at once, not gradually

to countdown – to count backwards (from a higher number to a lower one) to the start of a specific event

Grammar Corner

We use the *present perfect continuous* tense if we want to describe an event that started in the past and has some connection to the present. In addition, we want to highlight its duration (even if we are not mentioning it, e.g. for a year, since 2014, etc.).

e.g. I've been trying to find some cute presents for my nieces for over a week. I don't know what to get them!

How long have you been cooking? – I've been cooking for more than 13 hours now. I'm so exhausted. I just want this Christmas madness to be over.

We use the past continuous tense if we want to describe an ongoing past event that was happening at a specific moment in the past.

e.g. It was a New Year's Eve. Our parents were sleeping, I was playing video games in my room, and our cat was eating Christmas decorations.

What did you do yesterday? – Oh well. I was cleaning, I was cooking, I was working out, I was doing everything!
