Vocabulary

sunburned – having red and painful skin as a result of spending too much time in the sun

tip – a small but useful piece of practical advice

first-hand – (of information or experience) from the original source or personal experience

hall of residence (BrE)/**dorm** (short for dormitory) (AmE) – a large building at a college or university where students live

worn-out – (of a person) extremely tired or exhausted

noticeable – easily seen or noticed

issue – an important topic or problem

pessimistic – likely to see the worst aspect of things or believe that the worst will happen (the opposite of optimistic)

progress - the process of getting better at doing something

newbie (informal) – someone who has just started doing something and is inexperienced

follower – someone who looks at the messages, pictures, etc. posted by a particular person online

married – (of two people) united in marriage

friend – someone who you know and like very much and enjoy spending time with, typically exclusive of sexual or family relations

gardening – the activity of tending and cultivating a garden, especially as a hobby herbs – any plant with leaves, seeds, or flowers used for flavoring, food, medicine, or perfume

neighbour (BrE)/**neighbor** (AmE) – a person living near or next door to the person referred to

business trip – a visit made to a place for work purposes, typically one involving a journey of some distance

Verbs

to come about – to happen or take place

to get back into something – to start doing something again

to introduce someone (to someone else) – make someone known by name to another in person, especially formally

to introduce someone (to a hobby/activity) – to cause someone to learn about something or experience it for the first time

to guide someone – to help someone



to hire something – to obtain the temporary use of something for an agreed payment

to rush through something – to cause something to happen or be completed too quickly

to post something – to a message, picture, etc. on the Internet so that other people can see it

to document something – to record something in written, photographic, or other form

to think about something – to have a particular opinion, belief, or idea about something

to forget about something – to fail to remember something

to fix something – to find a solution to a problem

to deal with something – to pay attention to something, to solve a problem, or make a decision concerning something

to share something – to tell someone about something

to mention something – to refer to something briefly without going into detail

to join someone – to go somewhere in order to be or to do something with them

to unpack – to open and remove the contents of a suitcase, bag, etc.

Phrases

to get to know someone – to become acquainted with someone by asking them questions about their hobbies, interests, etc.

to go kayaking – to travel in a kayak

It's totally worth it! – to be enjoyable or useful despite the fact that you have to make an effort

Shoot! (informal) – Damn!

to sign up for a class/to take a class – to join a class

to fall in love with something – to develop a deep liking for something

to be into something – to really like something

here and there – from time to time

to be interested in something – to show curiosity about something

to make friends (with someone) – to begin a friendship with someone

to have a passion for something – to have a strong feeling of desire for something

to take one's eyes off of something – to stop looking at something

to be out of town – to be away from home

to take time off work – not to work because of illness or holidays, or because your employer has given you permission to do something else

Grammar Corner



In informal situations we can contract the following verbs: want to – wanna, what are/do you – whatcha, have got to – gotta. These contractions are used only in colloquial speech.

e.g. I don't wanna be here.

Whatcha doing?

Sorry, gotta go now. I'll call you back.

We use the phrase "It must be nice/great/etc. + Ving" when we feel a bit jealous about someone or something.

e.g. Your parents are paying for your trip? **It must be nice not having** to worry about money.

It must be great knowing everyone around here.
