Vocabulary

family – a group consisting of parents and children living together in a household OR all the descendants of a common ancestor nuclear family – a couple and their children, regarded as a basic social unit extended family – a family which extends beyond the nuclear family and includes grandparents and other relatives relative – a person connected by blood or marriage **parent** – a father or mother father – a male parent **mother** – a female parent stepfather – a man who is married to one's mother after the divorce of one's parents or the death of one's father **stepmother** – a woman who is married to one's father after the divorce of one's parents or the death of one's mother **grandfather** – the father of one's father or mother grandmother – the mother of one's father or mother **siblings** – a brother or sister **brother** – a man or boy in relation to other sons and daughters of his parents **sister** – a woman or girl in relation to other daughters and sons of her parents **twins** – one of two children born at the same birth **triplets** – one of three children born at the same birth **uncle** – the brother of one's father or mother or the husband of one's aunt. aunt – the sister of one's father or mother or the wife of one's uncle **cousin** – a child of one's uncle or aunt **nephew** – a son of one's brother or sister **niece** – a daughter of one's brother or sister in-laws - relatives by marriage father-in-law – the father of one's husband or wife **mother-in-law** – the mother of one's husband or wife **son-in-law** – the husband of one's daughter daughter-in-law – the wife of one's son **crush** – a brief but intense infatuation for someone **couple** – two people who are married, engaged, or otherwise closely associated romantically **boyfriend** – a regular male companion with whom a person has a romantic relationship girlfriend – a regular female companion with whom a person has a romantic relationship **fiancé** – a man who is engaged to be married



fiancée – a woman who is engaged to be married

marriage – the formal union of two people, typically recognized by law, by which they become spouses

spouse – a husband or wife, considered in relation to their partner

partner – one of two people who are married or who live together and have a romantic relationship

relief – a feeling of reassurance and relaxation following release from anxiety or distress

last-minute – occurring at the latest possible time before an event **casually** – in a relaxed and informal way

unbearable – not able to be tolerated

biased – unfairly prejudiced for or against someone or something

confrontational - tending to deal with situations in an aggressive way

Verbs

to send something – to arrange for the delivery of something

to make up (with someone) – to forgive someone and be friendly with them again after an argument or disagreement

to celebrate something – to publicly acknowledge a significant or happy day or event with a social gathering or enjoyable activity.

to hang out (with someone) - to spend a lot of time in a place or with someone

to show someone around – to go with someone to all parts, or the main parts, of a place that they have not visited before

to mention something – to refer to something briefly and without going into detail to survive – continue to live or exist, especially in spite of danger or hardship

to appreciate something – to be grateful for something

to intrude into something – to disturb something or have an unpleasant effect on it **to confront someone** – to deal with something very difficult or unpleasant in a

determined way

Phrases

to be up to something - to be doing something

to be pissed off (informal) – to be annoyed

to do something on purpose – to do something with determination

in the background – the part of a picture, scene, or design that forms a setting for the main figures or objects, or appears furthest from the viewer (the opposite of in the foreground)

to be fond of something/someone – to be extremely interested in something **to look like someone** – to be similar in appearance to someone



family gathering – an occasion when many members of an extended family meet together

to end up doing something – to do something even when you initially did not intend to

on my part – done or experienced by someone

Do you mind sharing? – a phrase used to ask someone whether they feel comfortable talking about something with you

to get on well – to have a good relationship with someone

to hold someone back from doing something – to keep someone from doing something

to be jealous of someone – feeling or showing envy of someone or their achievements and advantages

It's a blessing and a curse. – something that may seem initially beneficial but also brings unforeseen negative consequences

to drive someone nuts (informal) – to drive someone crazy

to lose one's sanity – not to have a healthy state of mind any longer

at the weekend (BrE)/**on the weekend** (AmE) – something that happened or will happen between Friday evening and Sunday evening

to go out with someone – to leave a room or building, especially to do something for entertainment *OR* to have a romantic relationship with someone

along the lines of – roughly similar

to take someone out – to go with someone to a place like a cinema, restaurant, etc. and usually pay for them

Grammar Corner

When we are describing a picture or a photo, we use the Present Continuous tense. e.g. Look at this photo! The kids are having a blast. **They're dancing, singing, running around.**

My father **is standing** right there, and my mom **is hiding** in the trees. She is about to surprise him.

We also use the Present Continuous tense to describe annoying habits and things that irritate us.

e.g. Why are you always doing that? You know that I don't like it when **you're chewing** with your mouth open.

My friend is always procrastinating and ends up doing her homework at night.
